
We would strongly encourage anyone who wants to make a difference to consider applying to be a College Captain or to take on a leadership role in the years to come.

### Year 7 Reflection Day Junior College Captains – Astrid Le Noury and Mila Pereira

We are the Junior College Captains of Sacred Heart Kyneton. Being a captain involves giving the Junior School a voice, and also representing the wider College community.

The process to gain a position on the Junior College Cabinet is to apply in writing, including details about ourselves and any leadership experience. Following the appointment of the Cabinet, training days are held to enable us to get to know our team – including members of the Senior Cabinet – and form plans for the current year.

Some highlights of the role are speaking to the whole school at Mass and Assemblies, attending seminars, and taking an active part in making decisions for the College. It is an amazing opportunity and we highly encourage others to give it a try.









## Deputy Principal – Learning and Teaching – Ms Debra McNaughton

Students at Sacred Heart College are encouraged to strive for excellence in the classroom. Sometimes this involves activities that extend students and show us what they can achieve. Year 10 students who have been part of our Learning Enhancement Program in Years 7 - 9 have the opportunity to study the VCE Extended Investigation which is a Year 12 subject. This develops students' critical thinking and problem solving skills.

Students have the opportunity to study many STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) subjects. Skills and knowledge learned through participation in these subjects build the confidence of students, and allows them to perform better in all of their studies. For example, coding is taught to our students from Year 7 in Robotics, while Year 10s can study 'Rev Heads' (Automotive Studies) alongside the more traditional subjects. Subjects such as Environmental Science at VCE and VET Animal Care broaden the range of STEM offerings.

The diversity of subjects available for students to select at Sacred Heart allows students to follow their preferred pathways. This ranges from a choice of languages (Japanese or French) as well as life skills in financial literacy and food studies.

As students are encouraged to strive for excellence, they are provided many diverse opportunities in which to demonstrate this with the support and guidance of Sacred Heart staff.



In Robotics this year many students had their first experience at creating a website. They used either Weebly, Wix or Google Sites to create a website on 3-4 robots of their choice from varying industries. They had to consider what features the robot had, the sensors it uses, advantages and disadvantages for both the people using the robots and also on the wider community. Students then inserted images in the website and embedded videos showcasing their robot in action.

As part of their second major project, students had the opportunity to build a LEGO robot in class. It needed to have wheels attached to enable it to move in various directions to create a series of programmed shapes, using Lego Mindstorm on the student's laptop.

A number of Year 7 students have had the opportunity to experience our newly purchased virtual reality headsets. In one of the virtual scenes, students were transported to the cold, rocky surface of planet Mars. Human exploration of planet Mars began with fly-bys in the 1960s giving clear images of the Red Planet. A series of robotic explorers have investigated the Martian surface, including rovers such as Curiosity, which has been exploring the planet since August 2012.

The 360-degree software enabled students to have the opportunity to explore the surface of Mars and learn about the appearance of this planet. They discovered the variety of instruments and the different power sources used by the Curiosity robot.









#### Year 7 and 8 Food Technology – Ms Belinda Kime

Food technology is a fun, hands-on, practical subject, where students learn a wide range of cooking techniques, and how to use a variety of different cooking equipment.

As this subject comprises different classmates to students' Homeroom, it is a wonderful time to make new friends and work as a team.



Animal Studies – Ms Marika Payne

At Sacred Heart College students in Years 10, 11 and 12 have the opportunity to study VET Certificate II in Animal Care. This involves caring for the seven different species of animals that we keep on site which include rabbits, green tree frogs, seahorses and native Mitchell's Hopping Mice. This qualification describes the skills and knowledge for entry level and support roles in the animal care and management industry, where workers provide care for animals in workplaces such as animal shelters, boarding/day care facilities, sanctuaries and veterinary clinics. Students learn how to handle, feed and manage the different animals, as well as how to maintain their enclosures and conduct regular health checks, including administering basic first aid. There are excursions to different animal facilities such as Edgar's Mission and the RSPCA,

as well as presentations from guest speakers including Veterinarians, breeders, wildlife carers and other workers in the animal care industry. Students really enjoy the hands-on nature of the course and the regular interaction with many different kinds of animals.



Each student will receive a cookbook, specifically created with fresh ingredients and modern recipes. Hopefully, some of these can be made at home for the family.

Some of the delicious items we make include pork banh mi, a burger of choice, an all-time favourite – chocolate brownie – and we try our hand at decorating biscuits.







## Deputy Principal Student Wellbeing – Ms Julie Mortimer

At Sacred Heart College Kyneton, we believe that everyone matters. This simple statement covers all members of our College Community - students, parents and staff. Our core business is, of course, learning, and all aspects of our wellbeing structure are aimed at supporting students in their journey through school.

Over the past few years, Scared Heart College has been developing and broadening its Student Leadership Program. Student Leadership is structured into Cabinet at both Senior and Junior levels. These cover all aspects of College life, with Senior and Junior College Captains overseeing their respective Cabinets. The entire leadership group aims at transferring student ideas and views into the school context. These students are the proud face of the College in many internal and external events across the Ranges, and appreciate the opportunity to be involved in their local community representing Sacred Heart College Kyneton.

We recognise that many students feel they have something to contribute to the continuous improvement of our school but may lack the confidence or the experience of a leadership role to put themselves forward. The 'Lead from the Heart' Leadership Training Program has been developed to address



this. Each training day consists of two sessions. The first is open to any Sacred Heart student who would like to gain further insight into what constitutes a good leader and what leadership qualities they might like to develop. The second session provides a planning opportunity for the current Student Cabinets. Guest speakers provide inspiration and life context, and the broad group have the opportunity to work with other like-minded students.

An effective social-emotional program as an adjunct to rich learning is vital. To ensure this occurs, Sacred Heart College has developed a comprehensive Wellbeing Framework. Our Mercy Values are each aligned to a Year Level –providing a focus for Reflection Days or Retreats at each Year Level. This program titled COMPASS at Junior School, and DRIVE at Senior, provides the vehicle for introducing and re-enforcing important life enhancing Personal Development skills.

Our Parent Engagement Program aims at ensuring that our parents, as well as our local communities, have the opportunity to access high calibre speakers on current and relevant educational topics. These events align with current views and practice at Sacred Heart College, and reinforce the notion that each of the three sides of the educational triangle need to be on the same page for optimum student outcomes. Topics of these events are varied, with all linking to either Learning and Teaching or Wellbeing.

#### **ANZAC Day Commemorations**

Sacred Heart College was well represented at ANZAC Day commemoration services around the district. Following easing of Covid restrictions, our students and staff attended local services across Mount Macedon, Kyneton, Woodend, Gisborne, Castlemaine, and the Victorian State Dawn Service at the Shrine of Remembrance.





# Year 11 Retreat Service to Self and Others – Mr Alistair Bloom

In May this year the Year 11 students from Sacred Heart College participated in an overnight Retreat at Camp Campaspe, Kyneton. The purpose of this Retreat was to allow the students to forge stronger relationships with their cohort, allow a break from the academic rigour of their studies, and importantly, allow them to participate in the Mercy value of Service.

On the first day the focus for the students was 'service to others' and on the second day it was 'service to self'.

The students were able to choose from a range of activities that were connected with providing a service either to others in need, to the landscape and nature around us, or connecting with students in the primary schools they attended.

The 'service to others' was conducted at the Kyneton food bank where students helped prepare meals for people in need. On that day they cooked spaghetti and a bolognaise sauce – which they were able to sample for their lunch.

The 'service to nature' was conducted at various venues and with organisations such as the Bald Hill Landcare, Cassinia Landcare, Friends of Black Hill Landcare and Landcare at Camp Campaspe. At these venues the students (and teachers) worked extremely hard to plant thousands of trees, construct steps using sleepers, and general clean up of the areas.

The students were also given the opportunity to return to the primary school they attended and complete a day of service to the school, either through helping teachers and students in the classrooms, or working in the grounds of the school to maintain and establish gardens. The students were very excited to return to the schools and visit the classrooms and playgrounds where they spent their junior years.

The energy and excitement the students showed at the end of the day demonstrates that the reward for their service to others was knowing that they had made a difference to the landscape we live in or in the lives of others, for no material reward. Overall, the Retreat was very successful in its goal of encouraging students to think of others, and how they can help in the community in the future.

The remaining part of the Retreat focused on 'service to self' through various reflective activities and liturgies, as well as connections to the cohort with group initiative courses and an exciting trivia competition. All positive, useful and inciteful pursuits before embarking on Year 12 next year.

#### The Heart Wellbeing Centre – Ms Samantha Sequeira

In addition to providing counselling services to SHC students, the Counsellors at the Wellbeing House have been running programs to benefit College parents and students.

Paul Hopkins has been facilitating Teen Mental Health First Aid, a program which focuses on teaching secondary school students how to provide Mental Health First Aid to their friends. This course was developed in response to research indicating that young people prefer sharing problems with peers.

Samantha Sequeira has been facilitating a four-week parenting program called 'Parenting with Purpose'. The program is aimed at parents of children in Years 7 and 8, and draws on parents existing strengths, skills, and knowledge, whilst enhancing their connection with their children through Emotion Coaching. The interest in this program was overwhelming, and we hope to be able to offer this program to parents again next term.

#### Mercy@Work: 'Caritas Ks' Events

Following on from last year's success, the Mercy@Work team once again ran the 'Caritas Ks' event at the College Swimming Carnival. Throughout the day, over 40 students took up the challenge to carry 4L of water for 1km (10 laps of the pool), in solidarity with those who must walk to access fresh water.

The Year 7 cohort then participated in a further 'Caritas Ks' event on Monday 28 March. This event was held in the spirit of 'challenge by choice', with each Year 7 student invited to carry 4L of water for at least two laps of the oval (approximately 1km).

The results of the event are commendable. Over the course of the day, our Year 7s walked a total of 570 laps of the oval between them, which is equivalent to approximately 285km.

Classroom Music includes a combination of theory, aural and practical activities, which engage young people and help develop a wider appreciation, understanding and repertoire of Music in their lives. We aim to assist students to take creative risks by stepping out of their comfort zones.

Our Instrumental Music Program involves three elements:

TUITION - students undertake weekly individual or pair lessons, face to face with the Instrumental Music teacher.

ENSEMBLES - students are required to participate in at least one ensemble, in order to engage in music-making with other young musicians; and


PERFORMANCE - students learn the art of performance through playing in front of a small, supportive audience once per semester.

Our Instrumental Music Program is supported by ten expert Instrumental Music teachers, each with a rich background in Music performance.

The social and musical relationships developed through Music are fantastic. We also see a significant correlation between students who study Music and those who are recognised for their academic and leadership excellence within the College.









#### Transition – Ms Jody Takos

Many students and their families will have visited Sacred Heart long before commencement at the College. Some families will have taken the opportunity of attending our Open Evenings, which showcase the variety of opportunities available in both the junior and senior years, and enjoyed the activities set up by a number of the different learning areas. Many have also taken advantage of the College Tours to get a better insight into the College.

In March every year students from our feeder schools in Grade 5 get a glimpse into the life of Sacred Heart. Feedback from the group this year was that they very much enjoyed swapping subjects and teachers every half hour! They created Lego robots, painted Picassos, made apricot balls, learned some French and Japanese, Maths, English and discovered some fun facts in Science. Visiting the amazing canteen and playing with those from other schools and the Peer Support students (from Years 8 and 9) at lunchtime were also on the top of student evaluation forms.

Our new students begin in January and are greeted with a Wellbeing Day. This day is set aside for getting to know each other and the Homeroom teacher. It is then followed by an amazing day at Melton Wave Pool to strengthen newly formed friendships. Early in Term 1, the Year 7s attend a team building camp, where they can make friends with those from other classes and test their personal strengths. Other highlights on the transition calendar are the College Swimming Carnival, the Athletics Day and the Tabloid Sports, these days are where the College House Spirit shines.
