

Mercy Day Celebrations: In Support of Mercy Works

Mercy Day is a global celebration, on which all people in Mercy communities across the world mark the anniversary of Catherine McAuley opening of the first "House of Mercy" in Dublin in 1827. At Sacred Heart, we mark this special occasion by holding a day of fun and festivities. It is also our biggest fundraising event for the year, with all money raised being donated to Mercy Works.

Mercy Works operates in Australia, Papua New Guinea, Timor Leste and the Philippines. It is an initiative of the the Sisters of Mercy of Australia and Papua New Guinea, and is one of their main outreach organisations. Mercy Works operates by supporting long term development projects in Australia and in our Asia-Pacific region. As they do so, Mercy Works supports some of the most challenged and vulnerable people in our neighbourhood, as they work towards achieving dignity and self reliance. Over many years, Mercy Works has established a proud tradition of transforming the future, improving the health, enhancing the social wellbeing and expanding the educational and economical opportunities of those they work with. While their work overseas is focused on community development, Mercy Works' focus in Australia is on supporting First Nations projects, as well as working with refugee and asylum seeker students in schools and adult literacy programs.

MORE ABOUT MERCY DAY

Mercy Day at Sacred Heart College will be celebrated this year on Friday 9 September. This will be the first Mercy Day we have been able to hold in three years! Due to this time lapse, we have had to remind students and staff, and now parents of what happens on Mercy Day. The most important aspect of Mercy Day is that it raises money for Mercy Works, the charity arm of the Mercy Order. The morning is taken up with our Sacred Heart College Cross Country competition and the fun Colour Run. The Cross Country is a timed race and the student with the fastest time has their name added to the inaugural Mercy Day Cross Country Trophy. Everyone is encouraged to have a go.

The Colour Run is a novelty event that is a lot of fun. Students change into old, preferably light coloured clothes so that the colours stand out, and run or walk the course while getting environmentally friendly coloured powder thrown on them! This is a great source of amusement for students. It is also a major part of the fundraising aspect of Mercy Day. The cost of entry to the Colour Run is \$5. Students come in casual clothes on the day, and change into old clothes for the Colour Run. On completion, students can get photographed, they brush off the powder in a cleaning station and then change back into their casual clothes. They will be need to be clean to be allowed on the bus at the end of the day. They will need to bring a plastic bag with a towel and their change of clothes.

Following the races, we have the other major fundraising aspect. Each Year Level has been responsible for developing ideas to raise money. These vary from raffles, to sideshow games to more elaborate features. There is a dunking machine, whereby senior student and teacher volunteers sit suspended over a tank of water, and students aim to hit a target which will dunk them! There are other games of skill, all aimed at having fun and raising money.

Food for the day is also part of the fundraising. A BBQ lunch offering sausages, hamburgers and veggie burgers will be available, along with other treats organised by the students. The canteen will not be operating at lunchtime, other than supporting these options. Students are welcome to bring their own if they do not want a BBQ lunch.

Everything on Mercy Day is paid for with coupons. These are pre-purchased at \$2 each using the envelopes given out in Homeroom. Students can collect a replacement if they have lost this from the student office. They bring their money (up to \$10 for coupons, \$5 for the Colour Run) in these envelopes and drop them at the Student Offices. On Mercy Day, during Homeroom, students will receive a little pack with their purchased coupons and Colour Run wristband. Everything will cost one or two coupons, and top ups will be available for purchase on the day from stalls in the Atrium.

Outline of Mercy Day is:

- Short Assembly to explain purpose and Program (Zoomed into Homerooms)
- Gathering at Basketball Courts
- Students change into running gear
- Races take place
- Clean up afterwards
- Year Level activities/fundraisers/lunch
- Clean-up
- Sacred Heart's very own showcase of our talented bands
- Wind up and normal dismissal time

This is an important milestone for Sacred Heart following the years of disruption we have experienced, and the first time in a long time we have been able to come together as a College and celebrate being Mercy.

Kids back in the kitchen

The Grand Final of the 2022 Junior Chef Competition was held last Tuesday evening, involving students in Grade 4 representing six Catholic Primary Schools from the region. The first round of the competition was held earlier this month in the College's Frayne Hospitality Centre, where the primary students were challenged to prepare a stack of three pancakes with a mixed berry sauce (in 45 mins). In the Grand Final students were challenged to prepare fresh fettucine with a Napoli sauce and present their best plate to the judges within the 1 hr 15 min time limit.

The Junior Chef competition aims to provide Grade 4 students with an opportunity to experience the secondary environment, while building on their culinary and teamwork skills. This competition also provided an opportunity for students at Sacred Heart College to act as mentors to these primary students. All schools were so keen to participate again after the event being was deferred for the last 2 years, due to the pandemic, having first been held in 2018.

Well-respected local food identities Diana Marsland – *Diana Marsland Cooking School*, Mark James – *Donkey*, Kyneton, Jennifer Beachey – *ExpertEats*, took on the role of judges for the event. MC for the final was College Captain Sam Gordon.

The winners on the night were the team from St Mary's, Castlemaine who were awarded an amazing 20/20 for final product – presentation and tasting. The winning school received a \$250 nursery gift voucher to allow them to purchase plants for the school's kitchen garden, and all competitors received a gift of kitchen items from supporting local business Mort & Pestle - the Kitchen Shop Woodend.

All at Sacred Heart College hope that this experience will be the start of an interest in cooking for the students involved for years to come.













VCE Unit 4 Food Studies – Ethical and sustainable farming excursion - Summer Meadows 12A

The Unit 3/4 VCE Food Studies class, as part of learning about ethical farming and sustainability, went on an excursion to learn more about local farming.

The first stop was the Metcalfe Mini Farm where we met Rob and learned about sustainability and organics. We fed chickens, saw giant pigs, planted seeds, hoed the soil and Rob showed us the many different types of hoes there are to create healthy soil for regenerating the land.

We then got the opportunity to milk a goat, with Rob demonstrating the correct milking method for the type of teat that this breed of goat has.

Following this farm, our adventure led us to 'Homegrown on Piper' for a delicious lunch made with ingredients from the Metcalfe Mini Farm. We got to see the entire 'paddock to plate' process from planting seeds to eating the food. It was a very satisfying experience. Despite the 2-degree weather, and torrential rain, our adventure continued by bus as we drove to 'Sidonia Beef' where we got a little bit lost and had to turn around a couple of times! We then met Sam who drove us through their paddocks. He spoke about the ethical farming of their cows, holistic grazing management, and we saw the cows change paddocks to enjoy new grass.

The day was cut a bit short, however due to the horrendous rain, but overall we had a fantastic day and learned so much more about ethical and sustainable farming. Additionally, a special mention to the fabulous Mr Minter who had to unexpectedly take us on the excursion when Mrs Kime was in isolation. Overall, it was a fantastic experience, and we all had a great day! Thanks, Mrs Kime, for organising the trip!

State Netball Championships - Eliza Duffy


On Wednesday 17 August, the Junior, Intermediate and Senior Netballers travelled to the State Netball and Hockey Centre.



The Unit 2 Chemistry class enjoyed a trip to the Ecolinc Science and Technology Innovations Centre at Bacchus Marsh on Monday, to take a hands-on approach to investigating the Area of Study 2 guiding question which is 'How are substances in water measured and analysed?'.

The group had the chance to undertake water quality tests like those conducted regularly by water agencies to ensure that drinking water is safe, and to monitor the health of waterways used for irrigation and by wildlife.

A variety of parameters were measured to provide an overall water quality rating including: pH, salinity, temperature, dissolved oxygen, nitrogen (as nitrates), phosphorus (as phosphates), turbidity and metal concentration.

Students particularly enjoyed determining metal concentrations as it utilises atomic absorption spectroscopy, a technique that relies on the absorption of energy by valence electrons of ground state atoms and was discovered by Australian physicist Sir Alan Walsh in 1953.

The students had a great day, and developed valuable insights into multiple techniques used in order to measure and analyse water samples.





SolarBuddy Program - Marika Payne

Earlier this year our Year 12 VCAL class ran a Social for the year 7 students. The money that was raised was used to purchase solar light kits from an organization called SolarBuddy. SolarBuddy is a global impact organisation uniting a global community to illuminate the futures of all children living in energy poverty.

The impact does not stop at just providing reliable indoor lighting, each and every JuniorBuddy light also:

- Allows the child receiving the light to study 78% longer, improving their educational outcomes
- Reduces exposure to toxic and dangerous fumes which has the potential to increase overall health of women and children by up to 60%
- Reduces a family's average weekly expenditure on kerosene by 80%, improving the family's financial security and safety



Offsets 1.28 tonnes of CO2 over 10 years, the equivalent to growing 21.3 tree seedlings over the same period. Our Year 11 and 12 VCAL students worked together to assemble the lights. They also wrote a letter of encouragement to each recipient. We hope that this project will make a difference to the 25 students that these lights will be delivered to, around the world.

Students have been considering their subject choices and speaking with their language teachers about the benefits of continuing formal language learning into Year 9 and beyond. We have also had a number of exciting activities taking place across year levels.

JLTAV Speech Contest

On Sunday 28 August, six students travelled to the Hawthorn Arts Centre to compete in a Japanese speech contest organised by the Japanese Language Teachers' Association of Victoria. The students had prepared for many weeks, working with Tankovich sensei and Twilley sensei, to memorise their speeches and perfect their pronunciation and fluency. Performing in front of a large audience was very daunting, but our students represented Sacred Heart well and we are so proud of their efforts and their conduct on the day. We look forward to acknowledging them formally at an assembly.





JLTAV Calligraphy Competition

It seems that the Years 7 and 8 students studying Japanese want to go to Japan....... Students wrote "I want to go to Japan" in perfect hiragana and kanji characters, and then wrote their name in hiragana down the left hand side. How beautiful is their writing? The work of ten students will be selected and entered into the JLTAV Statewide Pencil Calligraphy competition. Well done to all students and best of luck to the finalists. Hopefully, in the not too distant future this dream of going to Japan will become a reality.

Year 9 Onigiri Making

Two weeks ago, the Year 9 Japanese class had the opportunity to make onigiri, a popular Japanese dish where rice is moulded into a triangle shape, sprinkled with seasoning and

wrapped with nori. Onigiri are often

eaten as a lunchtime snack.

The students enjoyed learning the technique for shaping the onigiri, but most of all they enjoyed eating them! Oishii!
