PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE - Dr Darren Egberts

Principals Association of Victorian Catholic Secondary Schools (PAVCSS) Conference 2022

Over the last three days, I have been privileged to attend the first PAVCSS Conference for three years at the RACV Club, Healesville. This annual conference is open to each of the 103 Catholic secondary school principals across Victoria with around 60 in attendance this week. The keynote presenter for the three days was Professor John Warhurst who has written two books on the recent Australian Catholic Church Plenary Council. John explored what the Plenary Council was and what influence it may have on the future of the Australian church. In particular, he examined the vision of Pope Francis of a 'synodal Universal Church', where collaboration and discernment are emphasised rather than the divine rights of authority.

Next week sees our Year 10 students and staff heading to the Victorian Alps for the first ski trip since 2019. It is a prospect that has many Sacred Heart College households (including my own) filled with excitement and anticipation. 'THE DREAM'

We are very excited this year to announce our first school production '*The Dream*' at Sacred Heart College in a long time. Due to the pandemic, we haven't had a school production since '*The Addams Family*' four years ago, so students are really keen to perform again on stage.

'*The Dream*' is a 'hybrid' production, with many students working in the show in drama classes and also after school. Our brief was to get as many students involved as possible, having fun and presenting something unique, which we think we've achieved.

We are extremely proud of the work students, and staff, have achieved so far, and how they've supported each other to get this play ready in a record amount of time. Next year, we are presenting a full school Production, which we plan to start work on at the end of this year.

'The Dream' is a reimagining of Shakespeare's arguably most well-loved play *'A Midsummer Night's Dream'*. A group of more than 50 students and staff have been hard at work all of this term, and some of last term, working out how to present a Shakespeare play, in a very short amount of time.

Both Year 11, and Year 9, Drama classes have been essential to this process, as the students have taken on the bulk of the named characters, and have been spending their class time working out how to interpret Shakespeare, for a modern audience. We also have students from Year 7 to 10 playing other characters and being involved as dancers and musicians.

One of the exciting things about doing Shakespeare, is taking a play that was written 500 years ago and making it somehow 'fresh' for a modern audience.

'A Midsummer Night's Dream' is about a pair of lovers who flee an arranged marriage and escape to the forest, ending up getting caught in a power struggle between the king and queen of the fairies. On its release, Shakespeare's play would've been a 'riot' for the attendees. There is magic, mischievous fairies, fight scenes between lovers, slapstick comedy, dance and music.

Most people don't know that Shakespeare apparently wrote the play while he was writing *'Romeo and Juliet'* and there are many similarities between the plays; lovers fleeing societies rules, mistaken identity and obviously the role of women and men and the constraints of gender, which was very relevant in a time where women lacked power.

All of the female parts in Shakespeare's plays were actually played by young men!

The climax of *'A Midsummer Night's Dream'* features a group of inept actors performing a romantic tragedy for gathered royalty, in a scene that is very similar to the serious ending of *'Romeo and Juliet'*. On the surface, it looks like Shakespeare was ripping himself off, but he was actually using a storyline 'borrowed' from a Roman playwright, to present a similar scene in both plays, one for comic and the other for tragic effect.

We would love the Sacred Heart community to get behind the students in this play and come along on September 1, 2 and 3 to be part of this fantastic, 'once in a lifetime' event.

School Cyber Security Update – Matthew Shaw, Business Manager

Recently some school community members have received scam emails purporting to be from Sacred Heart College. These scam emails have been generated by an offsite email server, and due to enhanced cyber security works undertaken in recent months, do not represent a direct threat to or within the school network.

Please see below information which may assist you in improving your cyber security awareness, and decreasing the chance of a successful attack by cyber criminals on our community.



Cyber Security Information – Brendan Murphy, ICT Manager

Email is an essential part of the College's everyday communications with parents, students, and the wider community. Unfortunately, it is also one of the most common methods that hackers use to attempt to gain access to sensitive information. More than 90% of data breaches start with a phishing attack. Phishing uses fraudulent email messages designed to impersonate a legitimate person or organisation. They attempt to trick the recipient into downloading harmful attachments, or divulging sensitive information, including passwords, bank account numbers, and social security numbers.

Phishing scams typically attempt to take advantage of you by:

- ✦ Delivering file attachments that can infect your computer with harmful software
- ✦ Enticing you to click on links to websites that infect your computer with harmful software
- ✦ Tricking you into sharing your username and password so hackers can gain access to your network or other sites

Ensuring you understand and practice good cyber security is the best way to combat cyber threats. The Australian Government's Australian Cyber Security Centre has information about common online security risks, with simple advice on what you can do to protect yourself and your family.



Exchange Student - Artemis Report

Our Year 9 French students were lucky last week to listen to a French presentation from Artemis, our exchange student. She talked about her life in France, including her family, her hobbies, her school and Saintes, the town she is from. Students were asked to ask a couple of questions each, one in French, and another one in English. It was a great experience for them to hear and chat to a 'real' French teenager and practice their language.



I have been in Australia for the past 3 weeks now and I have noticed some differences with France. Here, people are more patient and more adaptable to situations. In France, days are longer and shops are closing much later. Australians drive on the right side and the French drive on the left side. It is super surprising at first! The lunch break is so short in Australia compared to France. The relationship between students and teachers is much less formal than in France. Here are some differences that I was able to see during my stay so far.

Je suis en Australie depuis 3 semaines maintenant et j'ai remarqué des différences avec la France. Ici, les gens sont plus patients et s'adaptent plus vite aux situations. En France, les journées sont plus longues et les magasins ferment plus tard. Les australiens conduisent à droite alors que les français conduisent à gauche. C'est super étonnant au début ! La pause le midi est également beaucoup plus courte en Australie. La relation entre les élèves et les professeurs est également beaucoup moins formelle qu'en France. Voici certaines différences que j'ai pu voir pendant mon séjour.

Year 8 Japanese Kendo Incursion

Last week Year 8 students were learning about Club Activities in Japanese schools. We welcomed Ben Sheppard, from Nanseikan Kendo club. Sheppard Sensei holds a Renshi 6th Dan in Kendo, and will travel to Japan next year to attempt 7th. You cannot obtain higher than 5th or 6th in Australia without going to Japan.

The students had studied about kendo in Semester 1, and this was a great opportunity to see the history and theories in practice. Kendo translates as the 'way of the sword' and has been developed over many hundreds of years from Bushi and Samurai for use in one on one combat.

Students learned the cultural way to start and end Kendo, that is with a bow. We learned how to do this both standing and sitting in seiza position. Also how to ask 'please teach me' and 'thank you'. Students learned how to walk, using a kind of sliding action, how to move forward and back, how to correctly pull their sword out and put it back, and be in the kamae (starting position). Then they were taught how to maintain focus and control of their swords, both on their own and with a partner. Using your voice his also a huge part of many martial arts, but particularly in Kendo, so students demonstrated this really well. Finally, one class even had the opportunity to hit Sheppard Sensei on the head with his armour on. This was a great highlight for many! Sheppard Sensei was a great teacher. So many students came up individually at the end of the lesson and said that they are interested in taking up Kendo, and were wondering where they could practice.

The student really enjoyed learning about and participating in Kendo. It was a great opportunity to bring language and culture together. Students are encouraged to continue with their language and cultural journey in Year 9 and beyond. Finally, we would like to thank the PE staff and classes for allowing us to use QUAMBI, when they normally would have practical classes in there. Australia continues to experience an increase in demand for skilled labour, which requires increased workforce participation, increased skill attainment and the employment of attraction and retention strategies. A large part of addressing this issue is providing ample education and information about the career and training possibilities and opportunities that are available to all Australians. National Skills Week aims to raise the awareness of the diversity of training and career opportunities available, pathways into training and education, and the importance of trades, skills and National Skills Week 2022 will take place from the 22 August until 28 August 2022.

More than nine out of 10 new jobs to be created in the next five years will require post-secondary qualifications.



Some of the jobs with the strongest employment increases are:

- Aged and disabled carers (up by 74,900 or 28.0%)
- Registered nurses (up by 40,400 or 13.9%)
- Software and application programmers (up by 42,200 or 27.0%)
- Database and systems administrators, and ICT security specialists (up by 29,100 or 38.9%)
- Management and organisation analysts (up by 28,200 or 32.2%).

Jobs growth is projected across a range of industries but projections show four services industries accounting for almost two-thirds of employment growth to November 2026.

Five-year employment projections show very strong employment growth for professionals (up by 494,200 or 14.7%) and community and personal service workers (up by 188,900 or 13.5%).

This reflects the strong growth expected in the services industries that are the leading employers of workers in these occupational groups. Together, these two occupational groups are expected to account for nearly 60% of total employment growth over the next five years.


