Easing of Covid-19 Restrictions

Following announcements last weekend by the Victorian Government, restrictions on a range of school activities such as camps, excursions, visitors to the College, assemblies and liturgies will ease from next week. I am waiting on full details of these and will communicate them when available. Some key points:

- The scheduled Year 10 Camp (Grampians) and Year 9 Camp (Anglesea) will proceed next month.
- We expect school end of year activities including assemblies, liturgies, transition days to proceed.
- All visitors to the College for events, assemblies, parent meetings, etc will be required to be double-vaccinated and to have evidence to support this.

It was truly an inspiring conference. Thank you to the students who attended and Mrs Egberts.






Standing Up and Speaking Out Year 9 Religious Education

Here are the beautiful illuminated manuscripts by 9C students.






Black Out Poetry



The clinic will occur in the Applied Learning Hub portables from 10:30 am, those students receiving their Pfizer vaccination are to be in full PE uniform, are encouraged to eat a healthy breakfast, and are to bring their water bottles along with them to the vaccination session.

Allergies, COVID-19 and VCE

Hayfever season is upon us! There are some similarities between hayfever symptoms and those of COVID-19. Students who have a known history of hayfever are advised to consider how their hayfever can be proactively managed during the VCE assessment period.

As symptoms can be similar it can be difficult to tell the difference between them. It is important that students or parents/carers/guardians do not assume these symptoms are due to hayfever or asthma. If the student has symptoms in any way different to their usual symptoms of asthma or hayfever, they should get tested for COVID-19 and stay home until they receive a negative result.

The best way to prevent symptoms of hayfever or asthma is to have an up-to-date hayfever or asthma treatment plan and follow it. If students don't yet have a plan, now is the time to check in with your GP.

Parents/carers and staff should also consider getting a medical certificate from their treating GP to confirm that it is safe for them to attend school with persistent symptoms that may overlap with some of the symptoms of COVID-19, such as cough or runny nose.

Students may want to seek medical advice about having medication on hand to take pre-emptively on exam days if hayfever symptoms are likely.


French Sport Games

2020 Arrangements

As parents and families would be aware, normal College Service Scheme operations for 2020 were suspended part way through 2020 due to Covid-19 restrictions. College Service Scheme involves families being charged a voluntary contribution amount of \$200 at the start of each year, with the option on electing to provide up to 10 hours voluntary work to have this contribution reimbursed (on a pro rata basis) at the end of the school year.

- families who paid the 2020 contribution were not charged this contribution in 2021
- families who had indicated their interest in, or who had completed any hours in 2020, had their deadline to complete the 10 hours extended to the end of the 2021 school year.

2021 Arrangements

- new families who commenced with the College Term 1 2021 will have been charged the voluntary contribution.
- Though the program has continued with various on and off-site opportunities in 2021, there have been some cancellations due to changing COVID-19 restrictions. Parents who committed to events which were later cancelled beyond the College's control have had their committed hours counted as volunteer contributions.

2022 Arrangements

Given uncertainty regarding the COVID-19 pandemic and existing regulations surrounding volunteer work in 2022, Sacred Heart College Kyneton will regretfully be suspending the College Service Scheme Volunteer Program for 2022, with a hope that we can return to past practice with sufficient opportunities for parent volunteer work at the College recommencing in 2023.

Financial Arrangements

Consideration of Educational Disadvantage

Information for Parents/Guardians/Carers

The VCAA recognises that some students enrolled in one or more VCE or scored VCE VET Unit 3–4 studies have experienced particularly difficult circumstances this year as a result of coronavirus (COVID-19). This includes health and wellbeing challenges, financial stress, extra home responsibilities and family stresses.

To ensure fairness for all students, Consideration of Educational Disadvantage (CED) will be considered for all students. In support of this process, all students can submit a Student Statement. The Student Statement is a simple tick box exercise which will inform the process of CED. No supporting evidence is required. However, the school can ask for clarification if needed.

As part of the process, it is important to understand that number of boxes ticked does not equate to a change in study score. This information will complement what the school already knows about students, for example previous assessment scores. The school will use documented evidence about the student's achievement when undertaking the CED process, with the normal VCAA processes ensuring fairness within and between schools.

The student statement will remain with the school. It is not provided to the VCAA.

The VCAA will consider the information submitted, and other external assessments including the student's General Achievement Test results, so that each student's final VCE and VCE VET results are fair and reliable.

As in previous years, students can apply for a Derived Examination Score (DES) if they are prevented from sitting one or more VCE examinations, or if they are significantly affected during an examination, for example because of illness. In addition, students applying for tertiary places in 2021 should submit a Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS) application to the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC), if they have been severely impacted by factors including COVID.

The VCAA is a statutory authority established under the *Education and Training Reform Act 2006*. All personal information collected by the VCAA is handled in accordance with the *Privacy and Data Protection Act 2014* (Vic) and, where applicable, the *Health Records Act 2001* (Vic).

Please continue to encourage your child to stay focused and work hard towards their VCE examinations.

Hansen Scholarship Program is designed for high-achieving students who may otherwise struggle financially to access higher education and provides a full package of benefits.

There may be students in school who are aiming for the University of Melbourne but face the challenge of funding their accommodation. The Hansen Scholarship provides free accommodation in Little Hall for 48 weeks each year of their three-year undergraduate degree. This is certainly an incentive for them to apply and give it a go. To be eligible for the 2023 Hansen Scholarship students must be:

1. Currently in Year 11 (apply in Year 12)
2. Australian citizen or permanent resident
3. Completing an Australian Year 12 certificate or IB
4. Be on track to achieve a 90+ ATAR
5. Can demonstrate financial hardship

Spirited



The VCE Art, Media, Textiles and Design exhibition is taking place at the Old Auction House in Kyneton 28 October – 8 November.
