PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE - Dr Darren Egberts

Today's prayer commemorates the significance of today as Remembrance Day (or Armistice Day) for Australia, coming 103 years after the end of the First World War. As our country moves to post-pandemic conditions, one of the privileges we regain is the opportunity for local communities to fully recognise the sacrifice of all enlisted men and women across Australia's history. The College's participation in local Remembrance Day commemorations is highlighted below. This year marks the 100th Anniversary of the International Poppy Appeal. To commemorate this anniversary, students helped make a '100' poppy display in front of the Chapel prior to the laying of the wreath.

The sacrifice and scale of the world wars was brought home to me four years ago when I accompanied a group of students and staff on a trip to the battlefields of the Western Front in France and Belgium. It was a deeply moving and humbling experience, one where the personal stories, courage and selflessness of all who served was made manifest. On this trip, I was able to visit the grave of my great-great uncle Thomas Sydney Welsh, who was killed in 1916 on the battlefields of Flanders.

Venerable Catherine McAuley

In addition to the importance of 11 November as Remembrance Day, it is also the anniversary of the death of Venerable Catherine McAuley, foundress of the Sisters of Mercy. The life and words of Catherine McAuley continue to provide inspiration 180 years after her passing to the Sisters of Mercy in their ministries across the world, as well as the vast numbers of people who attend Mercy schools, are cared for in Mercy hospitals and aged care facilities, and are supported through outreach and other community programs.

Junior School Showcase

Today saw the launch of the Junior School Showcase with the significant work undertaken by students in Years 7, 8 and 9 on show. I would like to applaud the extraordinary efforts of students, staff and parents especially as these extended projects were almost entirely completed at home during remote learning. As a result, the challenge of maintaining focus over a period of months increased substantially.

Unfortunately, due to Covid restrictions, the College was unable to launch the Showcase live and in person but I encourage all members of our school community to have a look at the myriad of online student projects on display. Full details on how to access each year level's display are included later in this newsletter. Finally, special thanks to Nic Hanna and Will Shaddock (10D) for their efforts in designing and constructing the web infrastructure that supports these displays.

Accessing the College as a Visitor

With the reopening of schools to the general public, new regulations governing the access of visitors to school sites have been announced by the Victorian Government. Sacred Heart College is mandated to follow these with no capacity for flexibility due to local or special circumstances. The regulations are as follows:

- All staff, contractors and volunteers who work or conduct meetings onsite and inside school buildings are required to be vaccinated. Currently, this a requirement for partial vaccination with full vaccination by 29 November 2021. At this stage, we expect all SHC staff to be fully vaccinated by that date.
- Visitors to the College including parents, family members aged 16+ and other members of the community who need to enter a school building for a meeting or school event must have had at least one dose of the Covid-19 vaccine and must be fully vaccinated by 29 November 2021 (unless they have a valid medical exemption).
- Confirmation of vaccination status and QR code check-in are not required for parents or visitors who do not have a meeting or appointment inside a College building (Eg. to collect or drop off a student or a student's belongings).
- Visitors to the College needing to check in via QR code and show vaccination status are asked to do this via College Reception. Other arrangements will be put in place when the College is able to host larger events again.
- All visitors to the College are required to observe Covid-SAFE behaviours – regular hand sanitising, appropriate wearing of face masks, observing density limits and restricting travel if experiencing flu-like symptoms.

These traineeships offer school leavers and young people the opportunity to gain experience in schools ahead of further study or a career. Each traineeship includes opportunity to complete a VET certificate in an associated field.

- Learning Support (yet to be confirmed)

There is a welcome sense of normality at present which is quite different from the situation at this time last year.

For this newsletter, I would like to focus on the Senior School which is beginning to wind up for 2021.

VCAL students have completed the requirements for their courses and the Unit 3 & 4 VCE exams are mid-way. Some students have completed their exams, while others still have a week or so to go. The feedback from our exam supervisors is that the students' approach has been exemplary. We are so proud of the way the Year 12s managed this difficult year, and are finishing in a calm and prepared manner.

The ability to see them off with the Graduation Dinner, albeit a slightly more measured occasion, is fitting and we look forward to next Friday night.

Year 11 VCE students have started their exams as well, and their final formal school occasion for 2021 will occur on Thursday 18 November with a Liturgy and Awards Assembly that follow the English exams (VCE students), and Step Up for VCAL students.

Step Up for VCE Units 3 & 4 then begins. Students will have a day of classes for each subject. This provides an opportunity for teachers to get to know their classes (where possible), and for students to be introduced to key concepts that they will need in order to begin the 2022 school year well. There will be some holiday work for students to complete, and all Step Up materials will be put in Documentation for Families which can be accessed through PAM.

The feedback is that the Year 10 Camp at Halls Gap is going well. Students will then have a week of revision before their exams begin. Step Up for VCE classes will consist of a half day (2 periods) for each of their 2022 subjects, with the same aims as the Year 12 Step Up.

Everything is in place for a positive finish for the Year 12s, and procedures to ensure that we have Year 10 and 11 students who are well prepared for 2022 – no matter what it throws at us!

Semester Two Examinations: Year 10 - Wednesday 22 to 26 November

Information about the Semester Two examination has been sent via Operoo. Please take the time to read and respond accordingly.

These examinations are an opportunity for students to develop strategies to prepare for this type of assessment. Students should create a revision timetable to allocate equal amounts of time to each subject. Teachers will provide students with revision material that will guide them in their preparation for exams.

Step Up Program

All students moving through the Senior school will be involved in a Step Up program for their pathway. This program introduces the course students will study in 2022, including topics, types of assessment and weighting of these tasks.

Teachers will make a start on the course and set holiday homework that must be completed for the first week of school, as stated by the subject teacher. An Operoo containing more information about the Step Up program has been sent to all year 11 parents/guardians. The Operoo for Year 10 will be sent very soon.



Mercy@Work: Introducing 'The Pantry'

Each fortnight, staff at Sacred Heart College offer monetary donations to the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre via our College's payroll giving program. These contributions are warmly welcomed by the ASRC, as they go towards supporting those who have arrived seeking safety in our community.

We are hoping to broaden the scope of our connection with the ASRC by opening a 'Sacred Heart Pantry' that students and families are invited to contribute to. "The Pantry" will stock specific non-perishable food and other grocery items that have been identified by the ASRC as the most needed for their Foodbank program. The ASRC Foodbank provides free grocery items to more than 1000 people, who often have no income or working rights.

We will launch a full program in support of 'The Pantry' for all Year Levels in 2022. For the remaining weeks of this school year, we invite all families to give our 'Pantry' an initial kickstart, by bringing in some of the items on the list. The pantry cupboard itself is located in the Library, and students can place their donations directly into it.

We ask that you please only bring in items from the list, as this ensures that we are offering the most practical help:









Fighting Extinction in and around the Macedon Ranges - *Marissa and Ruby, Year 11*

Over the course of 2021, as part of our VET Certificate II in Animal Studies, we were given the chance to learn about Phascogales as a species. At the beginning of this year we applied to participate in the Fighting Extinction Zoos Mentor Program, and were lucky enough to be selected.

We have been working with two Zoo mentors, Rebecca Gray and Liam Birkett, from Healesville Sanctuary. They have been a fantastic help with our research. Both Animal Studies classes have been well-informed on a variety of issues related to the Brush-Tailed Phascogales, including: their habitat, diet, physical features, threats to their survival, and the origins of the species.

Recently, we successfully applied for a \$1500 grant from the Macedon Ranges Council. This will be used to purchase purpose-built, nest box monitoring cameras to be used in nesting boxes that we have designed and will install in our local area, helping us monitor population and further study Phascogale activity. We have also been asked to complete a video presentation task for Zoos Victoria about our Brush-Tailed Phascogale project, which we are hoping will be chosen to feature in the Zoos Fighting Extinction Showcase, later this month.

We were also fortunate to be able to attend a Macedon Ranges Biodiversity Exhibition at the Kyneton Museum recently. Here we learnt new and interesting things about our local animals and environment from MRSC Environment Officer, William Terry. We are now in the process of building new nest boxes, to be installed in 2022, and educating our local community about our diverse local wildlife. With the community support we can make sure these animals are here for generations to come.



Consideration of Educational Disadvantage

Information for Parents/Guardians/Carers

The VCAA recognises that some students enrolled in one or more VCE or scored VCE VET Unit 3–4 studies have experienced particularly difficult circumstances this year as a result of coronavirus (COVID-19). This includes health and wellbeing challenges, financial stress, extra home responsibilities and family stresses.

To ensure fairness for all students, Consideration of Educational Disadvantage (CED) will be considered for all students. In support of this process, all students can submit a Student Statement. The Student Statement is a simple tick box exercise which will inform the process of CED. No supporting evidence is required. However, the school can ask for clarification if needed.

As part of the process, it is important to understand that number of boxes ticked does not equate to a change in study score. This information will complement what the school already knows about students, for example previous assessment scores. The school will use documented evidence about the student's achievement when undertaking the CED process, with the normal VCAA processes ensuring fairness within and between schools.

The student statement will remain with the school. It is not provided to the VCAA.

The VCAA will consider the information submitted, and other external assessments including the student's General Achievement Test results, so that each student's final VCE and VCE VET results are fair and reliable.

As in previous years, students can apply for a Derived Examination Score (DES) if they are prevented from sitting one or more VCE examinations, or if they are significantly affected during an examination, for example because of illness. In addition, students applying for tertiary places in 2021 should submit a Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS) application to the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC), if they have been severely impacted by factors including COVID.

The VCAA is a statutory authority established under the *Education and Training Reform Act 2006*. All personal information collected by the VCAA is handled in accordance with the *Privacy and Data Protection Act 2014 (Vic)* and, where applicable, the *Health Records Act 2001 (Vic)*.

Please continue to encourage your child to stay focused and work hard towards their VCE examinations.
