Interruptions next week

Camps and Excursions

One of the important aspects of school that was mostly lost in 2020 was the wide variety of camps and excursions that students enjoy. Thankfully, the Victorian Covid-19 situation seems stable and a number of important camps and other activities are planned for coming weeks:

THE LANGUAGE WE USE

The beginning of 2021 has seen many norms and behaviours being challenged across society. The language we use is one of these. The things we say to each other can be encouraging and life giving, stressful and soul destroying, and everything in between. Our language is the most obvious reflection of ourselves towards other people. No one likes to be spoken to rudely or abused, whether you are a teenager or an adult, but unfortunately this occasionally happens in most of our daily lives. This can be upsetting and can make us doubt ourselves, and think differently about the person directing these comments.

When this abuse escalates into sexist, racist or homophobic language, it can have far greater ramifications on the victim. It can mean the end of their confidence, which may prevent them from pursuing or participating in the things they love, cause them to withdraw by seriously effecting their self-esteem, and in the worst-case scenario, self-harm or suicide. These comments are usually accompanied with 'I was only joking' when challenged, but this is not a joke. It is never the intention of the perpetrator that is considered, but the perception of the victim that matters. We do not want any of our students at our College to feel different or less worthy as a result of these types of comments, and we deal seriously with them if they come to light. It is not OK to say things to girls as have been in the media this week, to question a young persons' sexual orientation or make a racist remark just because you can. We do not have a major problem with this issue at SHC, but any nasty comment is one too many. They say more about the person making the comment than anything else. It is noticed by others and it is never forgotten. The days of 'boys will be boys' and 'it was a joke' are long gone and these views will no longer be accepted. Please discuss this with your child .

HEAD OF SENIOR SCHOOL - Paul Matthews

The unpredictable nature of the last several months highlights the need for our Senior School students to develop their D.R.I.V.E.. This is the framework on which the Senior School team has based our Wellbeing programs for this calendar year. D.R.I.V.E. is an acronym for Direction, Resilience, Independence, Vitality and Efficacy.

So far this year, Year 10 and 11 students have been involved in a talk with Kate Fitzsimons who is a Teen Resilience Coach & Motivational Speaker. Kate introduced the concept that RESILIENCE is about 'response-ability', where individuals always have the ability to choose how they feel and respond to any situation in life.

To assist with the DIRECTION of our Senior School Students, Year 10's completed a Time Management session that was presented by Elevate on 23 February. Year 10 is an opportunity to develop new learning behaviours, refining them as the year progresses in preparation for Years 11, 12 and Post-secondary schooling. Elevate will present a goal setting session on Wednesday 10 March to our Year 11 students. This session will assist students to set meaningful goals they can work towards this year.

Year 12 students are well underway in their VCAL, VET and VCE subjects. In about two weeks, they will have an opportunity to pause and go on Retreat at Rutherford Park, Blampied. While on Retreat, students will have an opportunity to come together as a cohort, reflect and build on their resilience as well as their efficacy. There are a number of amazing activities planned for the three days they are away. Parents/Guardians, please remember to write your letter to your student for Retreat.

MEDICATION SAFETY

Students are no longer able to keep medications in their school bags, lockers or on their person due to safety concerns. To ensure safe administration and storage of medications, any student requiring medication while at school must hand their medication into FIRST AID where it will be stored in a locked cupboard. Medication needs to be clearly labelled with the students name and in its original packaging. <u>All</u> medication needs to be accompanied by a completed Medical Authority Form. A Medical Authority Form can be found on PAM and on the College website under enrol with us/policies and forms.

MEDICATION AND CAMPS

Throughout this term, Year 9 Religious Education students have been studying 'compassion towards those seeking safety'. The focus of this study has been towards refugee and asylum seekers. Part of the assessment for the Year 9 RE course has focused on the life, hopes and dreams of someone who has been a refugee. On 23 February, the Year 9 RE students attended the theatre for an incursion to learn more about what life has been like for someone who has been a refugee. Due to illness and transportation issues, only one presenter was on offer from the Centre for Multicultural Youth.

Mohamed Samara saved the day by zooming in to the Mary Moloney Theatre about his life in Sudan, and what it has been like to live in Australia. Mohamed is a university student, youth activist, founder of Endeavour Youth Australia organisation, as well as a guest speaker. He is also working to establish a youth leadership program to assist



young people to be the best versions of themselves. Mohamed's hope is to stop the stigma and preconceptions often faced by African refugees and migrants.

Year 9 RE students were able to watch and view images and videos of Mohamed's life while listening to his story. They were able to ask him questions that they had been contemplating throughout their study, and found the experience very enriching. We feel very blessed to have heard Mohamed's story and to have learned more about the hopes and challenges that many refugees and migrants face whilst living in Australia.

The College Swimming Carnival will be held at the Sunbury Aquatic Centre on Thursday 11 March. Regardless of weather conditions (unless they place us at risk) we will push ahead with the Carnival.

All students will travel to and from the Swimming Carnival by bus, departing the College after morning Homeroom and returning in time for normal dismissal. The College must meet its legal obligations with regards to Child Safe Regulations.

IMPORTANT - ALL STUDENTS MUST COME TO SCHOOL IN THE MORNING - BUSINESS AS USUAL

Parents will not be able to drop off students at the pool in the morning - students need to be here at the College for Homeroom as per a normal school day. The roll will then be marked.

PICK UP PROCEDURE

If it is unavoidable that you pick up your student from the pool at the end of the day, further information will be given closer to the date on how to do this.

Students are required to wear FULL PE Uniform to and from school, this may include the house polo. House Captains and Year 12 students may wear fancy dress in their House colours to the pool. Students are required to have a fitted face covering which they must wear correctly while on the bus and in the changerooms. This carnival will be carried out according to Sacred Heart College's 2021 Covid Safety Plan and in line with the Covid Safety Plan relevant to the venue.

The only swimwear options that apply to all College Swimming Carnivals and lessons are: **Girls:**

- One-piece bathers
- Two-piece bathers covered by a rash vest

Boys:

- Water shorts suitable for swimming (NOT board shorts)
- Racing bathers

Students are also required to wear a hat/cap, sunscreen, and shirt that covers their shoulders when not competing in events. House coloured hairspray and zinc are not to be worn in the pool. Students are encouraged to be Sunsmart and to bring sunscreen, hats and sufficient water.

The program will commence at 9.30am and conclude at 2.30pm.
