ACTING PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE - Julie Mortimer

BRYAN JEFFREY - Parent Engagement Partnership

No one could deny that the past year has been a difficult one. There has been a level of stress that has been created by the uncertainty of the pandemic, whether as a personal effect on our family or friends, or as a perceived threat and source of anxiety. This is still playing out as we know, and we have learned that we must be flexible and able to change direction if we have to. Sometimes this is easier said than done, and this layer of stress can add to others that are occurring in our life. This is true for both our students and their parents.



Last week, we were fortunate to be able to present Bryan Jeffrey as part of our Parent Engagement Program. Bryan is a Psychiatric Nurse who has founded MOAT, Mental Health Services, a support service for people experiencing mental health issues. Bryan spoke to our Year 8 students, staff and parents on managing this stress. He explained what happens in our brains when we become stressed and how this can lead to being anxious and even depressed. His message was one of physiology - our body is doing something that makes us feel as we do. It is not our fault, and there is nothing wrong with us. It was also reassuring, particularly for students, that if you are feeling down, doing things you love can help. These things are in effect your 'anti-depressants' and, along with other therapies that may be necessary, go a long way to increasing the positive chemicals in your brain.

ATTENDANCE

Another impact of building stress can be attendance at school. Attending school every day is the single most important indicator to a student's success at school. A student cannot do as well if they are missing out on the face to face teaching time that other students are receiving. Both parents and students do at times think that it is OK to miss a day. Many things can be blamed, sometimes rightly so. But at other times, it may not be the best decision. We know that if a student misses one day a fortnight, this equates to twenty days a year, or four weeks of school. It very quickly adds up. The more a student is away, the more disconnected they become from their peers. This builds anxiety, which is the main cause of school refusal developing. Keeping on going to school, unless there is an unavoidable, good reason, is vital for student wellbeing. The attached charts demonstrate clearly what a slippery slope the attitude 'one day won't matter' actually is. Remember - Every Day Counts.

Year 10 History Virtual Excursion with Australian War Memorial

"The interesting part of the Virtual Excursion was the 'instant feed' through a camera to look at the Tomb of the Unknown soldier and the huge numbers of poppies on the Roll of Honour." (*comment by a Sacred Heart History student*)

At Sacred Heart College, the Year 10 History classes had the opportunity to attend 'a Virtual Excursion with the Australian War Memorial' at the College's Theatre.

There was fierce competition to access this event with other Australian schools and, by winning we were presented with a great opportunity to utilise this invaluable resource to consolidate what we have been learning in classes.

During the term, we have been investigating the important role of Australian soldiers involved in the Battle of the Kokoda Trail and Australia's reaction to the bombing of Darwin.

With the use of interactive presentations and discussions, we gained an insight and appreciation of what this period was like for an indigenous family. We also became aware of the consequences of being separated from family members during such a chaotic period.

Through a feed with the War Memorial, we were able to view artefacts and artwork of Australia's home front. These proved to be great resources for an introduction to our 'Historical Guided Research Project'.

As a teacher, I was heartened by the Year 10 History students' apparent reverence and respect for Australia's contribution to World War Two. Many of them were simply awe-inspired when they viewed the beautiful stained glass windows, the tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the vast number of poppies, and the realisation of the lenth of the Roll of Honour Wall was.
