PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE - Dr Darren Egberts

This week's prayer reflects the College's unconditional commitment to holistic education based on the core Christian belief that all human persons are created in the image and likeness of God (Gen 1:26-27). This principle underlies Sacred Heart College's policies and programs to promote and develop inclusion and diversity across our community – students, staff and families. This week we recognised IDAHOBIT (International Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia) with posters around the school promoting inclusion, compassion and justice.

This week, I read with interest a number of online articles from the United States which detailed a letter that Pope Francis had recently written in response to questions often posed by American LGBTI families. One of the questions answered was how should God be viewed, *"God is Father and he does not disown any of his children," Pope Francis responded. "And 'the style' of God is 'closeness, mercy and tenderness.' Along this path you will find God."*

Recent IT issues at Sacred Heart College

I would like to take this opportunity to apologise for the IT issues that have affected Sacred Heart College since our servers were subject to a malicious virus attack a week ago. Ongoing challenges have been seen in the College's email systems and therefore capacity to effectively communicate with staff, students and families.

Together with our external IT support, Espire, the College is transitioning to a more robust email system and greater security access and hope that these will be in place by the start of next week.



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Rapid Antigen Testing

Following advice from the Victorian Government and its health authorities, the requirement for all students and staff in Victorian Secondary schools to undertake twice-weekly RATs has been eased. Beginning Monday 23 May 2022, the following guidelines are in place:

- RATs will continue to be distributed periodically to students and staff.
- Students and staff are not required to undertaken a rapid antigen test twice weekly.
- If a student or staff member is a household contact of a positive case, they are required to test five days in a seven-day period.

The requirement for household contacts to wear a face mask when at school and indoors remains.

College Activities

As the term approaches its halfway point, a number of small and larger activities have been enjoyed by students and staff:

- On Wednesday, the College Athletics Carnival was held in Bendigo with the cool weather balanced by bright autumn sunshine. A report, and all results, will be in the next Newsletter.
- Congratulations to many Year 7 and 9 students who have completed a series of online NAPLAN tests over the last two weeks.
- Congratulations also to our Year 11 students who completed a highly successful Retreat last week. The Retreat program included a day focused on social action as well as a day of reflection at Campaspe Downs. As part of the social action options, students assisted at their former primary schools, at a variety of local Landcare projects, as well as the Kyneton Food Bank.

This week we were privileged to have 'Whole New World' founder and presenter, Sonya Karras address all of our students in Years 7 to 11 on the topics of Vaping and Safe Partying. Her age appropriate and factual information, along with her humorous and engaging presentation style, proved a great hit with each Year level. Students were given the facts about vaping, the legal aspects, huge fines involved for selling to minors and serious health concerns that can develop from its use. We

plan to have Sonya return next year, and include a parent evening as part of our Parent Engagement Program. We completed a Junior School survey following the presentations, which has provided follow up information for us, but I would like you to ask your child what they took away from the session, and start a conversation. They are now more aware of the serious health risks, the deceptiveness of the advertising regarding what is in the vaping liquid, including nicotine, and the fact that the cigarette companies, particularly Marlborough, have a huge investment in the production of vaping products. This is targeted at addicting the next generation to a nicotine-based product.





A reminder of our consequences. If a student is caught smoking or

vaping at school, they will be suspended and parents will be contacted. The student will be required to complete a research task on the 'Consequences of Vaping' during their suspension. The vaping equipment will also be confiscated.

Parent Engagement Partnership - DAVID VINEGRAD

At Sacred Heart College, our Behaviour and Support System is a structured process based on the premise that everyone has the right to learn in the classroom. While there are procedures and consequences in place that ensure this can happen, it is backed up by Restorative Practices. This is an important aspect of being able to work together. It enables people to work through a structured process to be able to repair relationships that have been damaged, whether that's between students and teachers or between students and students. These skills are useful not only for school, but for work and home as well. Tonight as part of our Parent Engagement Program, we are fortunate to be able to host David Vinegrad, founder of 'Behaviour Matters' and an absolute Restorative Practice guru, who speaks around the world on this process. Year 10 Falls Creek Ski Camp : 22 - 26 August - Information for Families

Whilst August may still seem a while off yet, we will be beginning the preparations for Ski Camp with all Year 10 Students in the next few weeks.

Students will have an information session in Assembly in the coming weeks outlining the camp and what it entails, as well as the equipment required.

With regards to the equipment needed for the camp, students are provided with hired skis, boots, poles, and a helmet. All students, however, are required to have their own waterproof snow gloves and eye protection, either sunglasses or snow goggles. Whilst many families may not have these items, they can be borrowed from family or friends. In the coming months retail stores such as Anaconda and even Aldi will begin having sales on ski gear, and will have these items available for purchase at reasonable prices.

Students also have the option to bring their own waterproof snow jacket and waterproof snow pants, or they have the opportunity to hire them. If students choose to hire these items they are covered under the costs of the camp. Students will need to indicate this in the coming weeks, so it is very important that you discuss this requirement with your student.

After students have had their information session regarding camp, students will need to complete a Google Form via their Google Classrooms outlining their details and past skiing experiences. On this form they will be able to indicate if they need to hire the waterproof snow jacket and/or pants. This information will then be used to finalise our bookings with Falls Creek.

Further information, including the Operoo permission form and the Camp Handbook, will be available for families next term, closer to the date.
